PRE-REQUISITE: Completion of ASM3300 **OR** currently enrolled in ASM3300 during the fall semester **OR** will be concurrently enrolled in ASM3300 during the spring semester.

- Takes the consulting experience global.
- Provides 3-4 student teams the opportunity to work on project assignments with international corporate sponsors.
- The program includes:
 - Pre-departure sessions focused on consulting methodology and intercultural competencies during the fall semester.
 - Travel to the company site will take place over the winter break at which time students will develop the engagement contract and begin on-site primary research.
 - Project work will be completed over the spring semester concluding with the team presenting their findings and recommendations to their sponsor company in a written report and an oral presentation.

Objectives:

- Work with a team in a semester-long consulting project to address real challenge or opportunity for Women Owned entrepreneurial businesses in Portugal.
- Learn how macro-economic, social and political trends trends affect the strategies businesses in Portugal.

Benefits

- Improve cross-cultural communication skills
- Utilizing appropriate attitudes, knowledge about the host country and culture to develop real solutions.
- Sharpening your observational, analytical, and evaluative skills.
- Enjoy the hospitality of people in Portugal!



Pre-departure: Class discussions and assignments focusing on consulting methodology and putting in practice abroad, as well as, country's background and social, political, environmental, economic, cultural and historical context.

In-Country:

- Introduction to city and country
- Development of Engagement Contract & Project Timeline
- Daily work and interaction with contacts at company site
- In-country primary research, as necessary

Post-travel:

- Independent team project work throughout spring semester.
- Regular meetings with faculty.
- Regular meetings with company contact.
- Mid-progress Report meeting with faculty and client.
- Final presentation of findings and recommendations.

INTERNATIONAL CONSULTING EXPERIENCE

The Opportunity

The International Consulting Experience, an advanced spring elective course, takes the consulting experience global by providing student teams of three to four members with the opportunity to work on project assignments with international corporate sponsors. The program includes pre-departure sessions in the fall, focused on consulting methodology and intercultural competencies. Travel to the company site takes place during the winter break, at which time students develop an engagement contract and begin on-site primary research. The project work is completed during the spring semester with a team presentation to the sponsor company. The team's findings and recommendations are shared via a written report and an oral presentation.







STUDENT FINANCIAL SERVICES

Program Fee (Glavin)

• Any deposit to confirm a student's enrollment in the course, as well as the remaining balance of the program fee, is paid directly by the student to the **Glavin Office**.

Tuition (SFS)

- Tuition is paid directly to **SFS** and is billed at the 2019-2020 credit rate.
- Undergraduate electives are 4 credits.
- Graduate electives are 3 credits.



STUDENT FINANCIAL SERVICES

Scholarships

• Students who receive a full-tuition scholarship can use a portion of their scholarship to pay for their tuition cost.

Grants

- Undergraduate Education Abroad Grants in the amount of \$2,000 are awarded to students receiving need-based Babson Grants and full-tuition scholarships (cumulative limit is \$4,000).
- Graduate Short-Term Program Grants in amount of \$500 or \$1,000 are available through an application process on the Education Abroad website.
